

Ham Foundation Brings Mother Seton House Home

Our dream is becoming real! A \$65,000 gift from the Kendal C. and Anna Ham Charitable Foundation of North Conway will secure the purchase of our home! Our core mission is coming to life: to shelter pregnant women and new mothers with their babies, while they develop skills and resources for independence. We are coming home with this bequest, coupled with another from the Gibson/Woodbury Foundation, headlined below.

The Ham Foundation seeks "...to promote equity and access to opportunities" in the communities of western Maine and the Mount Washington Valley. Executive Director Robert J. Murphy announced, "The Foundation is happy to help support the Mother Seton House and its mission."



This sentiment makes us ecstatic beyond words.

A potential home came to our attention last year. Since then, pledges, donations, and fund-raising have produced a viable nest egg. In June, we signed a purchase agreement allowing us to seek specific financing.

Now we begin, using the Ham Foundation award to finalize our purchase, the Gibson/Woodbury grant to make necessary improvements, and donations from you, our loyal supporters, to provide furnishings and operating expenses. We are so grateful to all who have made this possible and we pray for your continued support as we prepare to make the beds and light the lights.

Gibson/Woodbury Gift Opens the Door

In June the Advisory Board of the Gibson/ Woodbury Charitable Foundation (GWCF) concluded its first year of operation by awarding Mother Seton House (MSH) a gift of \$30,000 toward a home in Fryeburg, Maine.

Mark Butterfield, GWCF Executive Director, explained that the MSH grant request among all others accepted in 2011 by their Board, exemplified the core values of its founders, the Gibsons and the Woodburys, that education should begin as early as possible and then be nurtured throughout child-hood in a stable learning environment to

form positive learning habits and to develop a strong work ethic. Coincidentally, the MSH mission of providing education, counseling, referrals, and physical, emotional and spiritual support within a caring community to new mothers and children was one of the guiding principles that the founders envisioned when they created The Gibson/Woodbury Charitable Foundation.

MSH thanks Mark and GWCF Advisors, Tom Smith and Ken Cargill for opening the door to our house.

The house was basically an empty shell. The park community is a close knit group whom we expected would welcome the mothers. We knew they would want to be involved but our initial meeting with the residents blew us away. After hearing Cyndi's presenta-

tion they were immediately supportive, making donations from tables and chairs to lamps, bed-

ding, towels and children's toys. For many it was that grandparent instinct but for a few it was just the goodness of their hearts.

We are grateful for what we have, but learned from our own families that being able to help others is much more gratifying. Our daughter and her husband came to make sure the curtains were hung and all was ready while we were away. That is another generation that has discovered the satisfaction of helping others. In fact, I believe that



we all realize that doing for others may be good for them, but it also leaves the giver with a "high" that you just can't buy.



Looking up – paying back

Robyn is wise and mature well beyond her nineteen years, giving clear priority to excellent care for two year-old Keira. She also is planning her own education, seeking out resources to help her as a parent and as a student.

Due to her respect for the programs and people which have been of aid to her through the years, Robyn has chosen courses in Human Services at White Mountain Community College. "I really look up to them," she said. A new driver's license will help in her education and job search.

While expecting Keira, she met Sunni, another mom, who recommended MSH. Robyn confided that the diapers, the baby clothes and interacting with other young mothers helped her survive. She took full advantage of MSH classes such as Baby Food Basics and Cooking Matters to Maine, both geared to low cost, good nutrition.

With a desire to "pay back," she is active in many MSH activities. One summer day, "Veggie Volunteers" Robyn and Keira picked fresh produce at Sherman Farm for herself and other MSH mothers. The next day, she shared the produce and organized a diaper distribution, offering additional

diapers on one of three facebook pages she has created for low income young parents. One site lists MSH classes and activities; a second helps parents share baby items and parenting advice and a third allows parents to connect for play groups. Her sites are models for other agencies.

"Robyn is a most thoughtful young mother, always putting Keira first", stated Director Cyndi Broyer. Her level of involvement shows in Keira's positive interaction with others and in her obvious experience with books as she leads a visitor through the pages.

Robyn and Keira are the first residents of Grace House (see page 2). In her initial tour, Robyn's interest was clearly Keira's comfort and safety, watching as she explored the space and noting the need to install outlet covers. Robyn says, "I am so grateful for Grace House. I have been bouncing between several places and with my parents. Keira loves having her own space. The neighbors have been wonderful, donated furniture, filled the cupboards, and brought gifts for Keira."

If the past is an indicator, they likely will soon benefit from return favors along with smiles and waves from Keira.
